The Franz Josef Land archipelago represents perhaps the last great outpost of historical sites related to the search for the North Pole during the period 1870-1940. From the expeditions of Payer, Weyprecht and Benjamin Leigh Smith to Fridtjof Nansen's overwintering, to the American expeditions of the 1898-1905, to the Sedov expedition, to the search for the Andrée expedition, the Italia, and the flight of the Graf Zeppelin, and the Soviet flights to the pole in 1937, these islands are a virtual catalog of archaeological data related to the human desire to reach the North Pole and explore the polar basin.
